After moving to Salt Lake, I became a member of the IPMS SLC. During my three years there I saw how an IPMS club functioned. It was a lot of fun but a new job opportunity took me further up the interstate to Pocatello, ID. I soon learned that there was no active model club there. One day I noticed a B-52 model suspended over a coworker's cubicle. I introduced myself and soon found that he too was an avid modeler. After discussing the dilemma of the lack of any organized modeling groups in the area, we decided that there had to be other local modelers that would enjoy a club. We arranged a meeting place at the public library posted flyers around town. Our first meeting only brought one newcomer but the next meetings brought more and more. We consistently kept it up and at one time had close to twenty members. For a community the size as Pocatello, that's outstanding! The core group of regular members dubbed me president since I took it upon myself to print up monthly flyers, direct the meetings, and head up the yearly planning. We did monthly workshop demos, a couple of model expos at the hobby store, one mini-contest, three make-N-take's, and organized car pools for several Utah IPMS contests. I created a club web page and member contact list. Since I still had a lot of friends in Utah, I volunteered to help out with The Gathering contest by creating the brochures and maintaining a web site. After more than seven years in Pocatello, a job change brought me to Boise.

One of the first things I checked out when touring Boise for the first time was the status of their model club. (I had heard the barking during The Gathering social.) I was relieved to find such a large number of enthusiastic talented modelers. (We'll still have to work on some of those social skills.)


